

I am humbled and honored to have been asked by our Grand President Christine Constantine to chair this very important committee and look forward to a rewarding learning experience from my contact with each of the Chapters in our Domain.

READ BEFORE USING. These words are found on manuals that come with equipment or appliances so that as a consumer you get the optimum results from your purchase. This same advice applies to the Constitution, By-Laws and Ritual Manuals that come with the Daughters of Penelope. Please take some time to re-read, or perhaps read for the first time, these documents that outline the principles, powers, duties

and manner by which our organization is governed.

The Constitution and Ritual have seen many chances in our 81 years. These changes have come from you the members and have allowed the Daughters of Penelope to keep up with changing times while still respecting our founding traditions.

It is wonderful to have this procedure that permits such grass roots management. At your chapter level, examine the Constitution and Ritual. If a change feels necessary, the proper form is submitted to your District Convention Legislation Committee; if approved at the District level, the form is then submitted to the National Legislation Chairman to be presented at the National Convention Legislation Committee. The National Legislation Committee considers all requests for legislative changes and if changes are approved by this committee they are

presented to the convention body for a final decision.

The instructions and proper form for submission of legislation or ritual changes can also be found on the Daughters of Penelope website: Daughters of Penelope.org. A letter with a due date and the form will also be sent to all District Governors prior to District Conventions.

The Constitution, By-Laws and Ritual of the Daughters of Penelope represent the structure of our Order. The opportunity for keeping this structure strong, and giving it a longer and stronger life, exists only when we the members become involved in changes and transitions for the Good of the Order. of the AHEPA Family. Introductions were made, committee reports were given and the vision and schedule was discussed. The District Convention information was presented by the Host City, Oakland.







FULL OF CHALLENGES. THE MARATHON TO ATHENS RACE GAVE BIRTH TO MARATHONS AROUND THE WORLD. TWENTY SIX MILES WAS NOT ESPECIALLY SIGNIFICANT EXCEPT THAT AFTER THE BATTLE OF MARATHON, IN 490 BC, WHERE THE PERSIANS WERE DEFEATED BY A SMALL GREEK ARMY. A MESSENGER WAS SENT TO TELL THE ATHENIANS OF THE VICTORY. HE ENTERED THE CITY AND SHOUTED "NIKI" THEN COLLAPSED AND DIED OF EXHAUSTION. CONTRIBUTING TO HIS DEATH WERE A TWO DAY RUN TO SPARTA TO SEEK ASSISTANCE.



# The Hellenic Heritage Institute of San Jose

The Hellenic Heritage Museum is an especially unique expression of the many new Greek American museums, archives, cultural centers springing up all around the country. The Hellenic Heritage Museum is part of the 14-acre San Jose History Park which showcases 27 original refurbished homes, businesses and landmarks that collectively highlight various periods of Santa Clara Valley's past (www. historysanjose.org). The Hellenic Heritage Museum fills the Nelson-DeLuz House which is a renovated neo-classical home built about 1905 and originally located on the corner of South Eleventh and Williams Streets in San Jose . Since, its grand opening on May 26, 2002, this beautiful white neo-classical structure has served as the headquarters of the Hellenic Heritage Institute (HHI). Given that the Hellenic Heritage Museum is host to several thousand visitors a year, not counting those who attend for the special events and tour groups, it behooves Greek-America to become more aware of this successful and singular cultural institution.

#### A Triptych of Cultural Programming

The HHI has quite consciously developed a "triptych" of Greek cultural programs focusing on education. First of these triptychs, is the Hellenic Heritage Museum . The principal theme of the museum is to present an Arhondikon, or Greek nobleman's home. The approximately 3,500 to 4,000 square feet of the Nelson-DeLuz's home has been transformed into an exhibition space composed of authentic Greek-made furniture and other historical objects such as photographs, needlework heirlooms, folk costumes, religious artifacts and other decorative elements all drawn from various parts of Greece. It was a stroke of genius to recreate a Greek merchant home of the 1880s-1890s. This choice of offering an upper-class home is striking because not only is it the only such exhibition outside of Greece but it is also unique in Greek-American historical presentations.

The vast majority of Greek sojourners to North America between 1880 and 1920 were overwhelmingly from peasant households of the Peloponnesos and the Aegean islands. But certainly not all Greeks everywhere were peasant farmers or shepherds, not even in North America . A vibrant Greek merchant class was found in coastal cities in the United States by the 1830s, and in ever growing numbers from the 1860s throughout the 1880s, just before the massive waves of the laborers in the 1890s. While Greek American historical accounts sometimes discuss the rise of a business class within the ranks of the overall community few systematic studies of this class exist.

As a first-time visitor to The Hellenic Heritage Institute I was especially struck by this presentation of a wealthy merchant family. The usual offering of Greek life, in standard American accounts and museum exhibitions, is one focused on rural life and that of the farming or shepherd class. The

HHI offers a more complete view of the complexity and variety of social strata in Greece . As I was told by local Greek-Americans, during the course of my stay in the San Jose area, even many of the local Greek-Americans were especially surprised by this aspect of the Hellenic Heritage Museum . Unfortunately the vast majority of Greek Americans know little of the actual history of the Greek people. In this simple act of accurate inclusion the Hellenic Heritage Institute offers a social economic perspective unique among all the museums or archives I have seen so far in North America .

For those wishing to better understand the early Greek merchant class one needs only consult Michael Contopoulos' in-depth study of the early merchants of the 1830s-1890s periods in his 'The Greeks in New York City: Early Years to 1910 (Aristides D. Caratzas Publisher, 1992).' For those wishing to extend their study of the Greek merchant class on a world wide basis I suggest you review Christopher Long's website (www. christopherlong.co.uk/migrations) and the Rallis Brothers entry on Wikipedia.org. I should also quickly note, if only in passing, that Professor George Kouvretaris has not only written of the Greek entrepreneur class but frequently lectures on this topic.

To be sure other exhibitions and art can be found in the various rooms of the Nelson-DeLuz House. Just to quickly mention one work of art we need only note Kati Casida's, 'The Memorial Chair of the Missing Persons of the Turkish Invasion of Cyprus.' As Casida describes her artistic memorial: "The village chair, wrapped in layers of white doves printed with names of 1,532 Greek Cypriots and Greek soldiers, missing after the tragic 1974 Turkish invasion of Cyprus, is a symbol of our hopes and prayers that many of them may still return to sit at their family tables. May we always remember and celebrate their lives."

Hellenic cultural classes compose the second triptych. The HHI annually offers classes consisting of dance, language, and cooking instruction which are geared for both 'people of Greek origin who wish to rediscover their roots and for non-Greeks who choose to explore the many aspects of Hellenic culture.' Depending on circumstances these classes are held or presented at the Nelson-DeLuz site or elsewhere. A working kitchen in the rear of the Nelson-DeLuz House makes the efforts at hosting and culinary instruction a seamless aspect of the Museum's everyday activities.

The third triptych focuses on the hosting and/or sponsorship of cultural events. These cultural events are meant to "entertain, educate and familiarize the general public with different aspects of performing arts including lectures, movies, theatrical performances, and concerts." Notable among these activities was a mock Cretan-style wedding held at the San Jose Historical Park with all the trimmings. The organa walked the bride and groom to an abstract altar with a choir which sang a few of the wedding hymns. A traditional wedding feast with roasted lamb and dancing followed. The HHI has also developed a program for school children who study Greece as part of their Social Science Curriculum. 6th grade social science this program includes history, language, Olympic Games, Greek folk dancing cooking and art. A Greek film festival is also part of the annual programs. All in all as far

as the HHI can determine (and I would have to agree) there is no other organization offering this kind of a complex of Greek cultural classes anywhere in the United States.

#### An Institute's Historical Development

Since 2005, among the many material products of the Hellenic Heritage Institute are the annual Kazamias/ Almanacs. In keeping with the nature of Greek almanacs these publications offer the cultural calendar for the Hellenic community along the western coast of the United States . Predominately English-languagekazamias' aside from the calendar of cultural and social events, offer 200+ pages of essays on all facets of Hellenism's culture and history, proverbs, recipes, and extensive cultural and business resources of Greeks found in the western coast of the nation. These are truly impressive volumes that, without exaggeration, could well be used in Greek school or Sunday school classes by Greek communities around the nation.

In the 2009, HHI kazamia we find an account of HHI's history development: "The Hellenic Heritage Institute (HHI) evolved from the Demotic Greek Folk Dance Group, comprised of San José State University Faculty wives. It was established in 1963 by Marina Moustakas, a faculty wife herself. The group existed for several years and performed at festivals, ethnic celebrations and international fairs.

In 1974, Marina Moustakas taught Greek Folk Dancing at the YWCA. Several faculty wives followed her there and were joined by a new group of enthusiastic dancers, among them Larraine McBride, who became the star student of that class. Larraine eventually took over the Demotic Dancers and directed the group with the ease of a native Greek.

In 1989 the group established itself as a non-profit organization under the name of Hellenic Traditional Arts Institute. The newly-named group continued its tradition of performance and education in the history of Greek dancing, costumes, music, and songs associated with the folklore of Greece.

In 1999 Marina Moustakas was reunited with the group, the scope of which was broadened to include many other aspects of Greek Culture and the Hellenic Heritage Museum was established. The Hellenic Museum ids the culmination of years of hard work and dedication of those people who truly believe in the preservation and propagation of the Hellenic Heritage.

The first time that the concept of a Greek Museum was presented to the public, in the Bay Area, was in 1971, when the first Cultural festival took place in San José . A Museum of Hellenic Culture was built for two days only! Some of those displays are now permanently housed in the Hellenic Heritage Museum ."

In 2000, Marina Moustakas relates it, by total chance; she got in touch with San Jose History Park and secured the Nelson-DeLuz House for the site of the Hellenic Heritage Museum . The rest, as they say, is history.

Marina Moustakas remains the fire-brand behind the establishment and maintenance of the Hellenic Heritage Institute. Born in Kozani , Greece Marina Moustakas first came to the United States as a Fulbright student at the University of Oregon . Moustakas has a diploma of Social Work from Greece, a B.A. in Sociology, and the credentials to teach Greek as a Second-Language from the State of California.

In 1962, she married Evangelos Moustakas, Professor of Electrical Engineering and moved to Santa Clara California where she still lives. The Moustakas couple has two children: Aristides and Sophia, and given that both are married three grandchildren Alexia Niki, Michalaki-Dimitri, and Andrea-Aristidi.

It is no exaggeration to say that Marina Moustakas remains the very heart of The Hellenic Heritage Institute.

#### Cultural Outpost for Hellenism

The Nelson-DeLuz site is also the HHI's administrative headquarters. Within the Museum is one of the ongoing projects of the HHI which is the establishment of a Hellenic Reference Library. At the moment the HHI has some 600 volumes of books in Greek and English covering such topics as history, geography, Greek folk costumes, Ancient Greece, cooking traditions of the Greeks, The Olympic Games, Modern Greek Literature, Poetry, Children's stories, Byzantine architecture and culture as well as numerous volumes on Modern Greece. Most of the volumes today housed at the HHM library have been catalogued and entered into a data base by a small team of dedicated volunteers under the direction of the steadfast Ed Hughot.

Several thousand visitors a year tour through The Hellenic Heritage Museum. This says nothing of those who attend the cultural programming.

As I visited the HHI earlier this year I was struck by question of 'How is it that such an articulate and active organization remains so little known outside its immediate region?' Especially, when the evolution of this group matches many other Greek American cultural organizations around the country. Having said that let me stress the point that no other Greek-American museum or organization anywhere in the United States exhibits the socio-economic complexity of the Greek people as seen on a daily basis at The Hellenic Heritage Museum.

Just like all the cultural organizations around the United States, The Hellenic Heritage Institute of San Jose, California (95112) needs your support (www.hhisj.org 408.247-4685). As a nonprofit organization the HHI is dedicated to the preservation and dissemination of various aspects of the Greek heritage. Monetary contributions are always welcomed certainly but other forms of support are as necessary, if not more so, for this especially fine institution to function successfully as a social institution. Simply serving as a volunteer for the public programming and other events are just as valuable as gold. For the real daily effort of the Hellenic Heritage Institute, aside from education, is to pass on Hellenic culture to the next generation of Greeks in North America. Come and visit The Hellenic Heritage Museum for yourself and see how a judicious mix of Elliniki philoxenia and education always makes

it the next best thing to visiting Greece. ❖


