



IN MEMORIUM ANGELO NICHOLAS LYGIZOS March 24, 1921 – May 29, 2013

Angelo Lygizos was born in the island of Andros, Greece, on March 24, 1921. At the age of 18 he signed on as a deck boy on a ship named "Nea Hellas" but upon arrival in the US he left the ship, taking only a pair of slippers with him.



His first job in this country was in the Gavallas restaurant in N.Y. city. He later moved to Holyoke, Massachusetts where he worked in a restaurant until 1943, when he was drafted in the American Army. His basic training took place in Camp Carson, Colorado where he met the man who was later to become his partner and life long friend, Anargyros "Roger" Antonopoulos.

While in training, OSS (predecessor of CIA) was established and Angelo volunteered for this dangerous work. On May 21, 1944 Angelo with another twenty two men Greek Americans landed in Greece and spent 182 days sabotaging the Germans by destroying railroads, ammo dumps and pill boxes. At last they returned home safe, with many memories and lasting friendships.

In 1948, Angelo arrived in California where he married Yvonne, the mother of his three sons. In the beginning he worked as a baker and in 1951 he open his first restaurant in partnership with his buddy Roger Antonopoulos. He later opened more restaurants, the last of which was Angelo's Steak House, on the Alameda.

Angelo's personality made him very popular to his customers and friends and he gained the respect and love of both employees and customers, who affectionately called him "Papa" Angelo.

Angelo was very involved with his Greek Community and the City of San Jose. A member of the BBB, The Mason's Lodge, AHEPA, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was the host of a Cooking show for 30 years on channel 2B Heritage Cable TV and he has written a cook book.

Angelo Lygizos, despite his personal tragedies and his "mature" age he has been very energetic till very recently, participated in most community happenings and he kept in touch with his many friends who were always glad to see him and share a glass of wine or ouzo with him.

His natural charm and grace was only surpassed by his kindness and warmth for his fellow man and his loyalty and devotion for the United of America and his beloved "patritha" Andros, Greece. *May his memory be eternal!*
